The Ministers of Health from African, Caribbean and Pacific (ACP) countries met for the Second Meeting of ACP Ministers of Health held from 25 to 26 February 2015. The first ACP Ministers of Health meeting was held in 2007. The meeting was preceded by the ACP Senior Health Officials' meeting from 23 to 24 February 2015. The main focus was to exchange views on the challenges and strategies of the health sector in the post-2015 period. To this end, discussions were focused on

Other health issues such as nutrition, finance predictability. Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs) and Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs), as well as progress on the Millennium Development Goals on health were common concerns amongst the countries present and were discussed at length.

Representatives from international organizations such as the European Commission (EC), World Health Organization, GAVI, Global Fund and World Health Summit (WHS) gave presentations on their roles in tackling the current health issues and the resources they could offer.

Ministers underlined the need for member states to endorse Universal health Coverage, with sustainable financing, as the over-arching health goal of the sector amongst the proposed Sustainable Development Goals. The Ministers also called on governments and development partners to increase their support for strengthening health systems especially in vulnerable states.



## Samoa Mission to the UN in New York

#### <u>Closing of the International Year of</u> <u>SIDS – 24 February 2015</u>

The closing ceremony of the International Year of Small Island Developing States (SIDS) was held on 24 February 2015. The event was organized by the United Nations Department for Economic and Social Affairs (UNDESA) and the Office of the High Representative for LDCs, LLDCs, and SIDS (OHRLLS) which included an Address by the Under-Secretary General of UNDESA, Mr Wu Hongbo, and remarks by the Champions of the International Year of SIDS.

The ceremony concluded with a Panel discussion moderated by the Under-Secretary-General of the OHRLLS, Mr. Gyan Chandra Archarya, focusing on the theme "SIDS issues as global issues: Positioning SIDS in the Post-2015 Development Agenda", which aimed to address the implementation of the SAMOA Pathway and ways this implementation will benefit from and strengthen the post-2015 development agenda, the Climate Change process, and the Financing for Development process.

#### <u>46<sup>th</sup> session of the Statistical Com-</u> mission, 3-6 March 2015

The forty-sixth session of the Statistical Commission took place at the UN Headquarters on 3 to 6 March 2015. Mr. Muagututia Sefuiava Muagututia, Government Statistician attended from Samoa. #### 59th session of the CSW

The 59<sup>th</sup> session of the Commission on the Status of Women was held at the UN Headquarters from 9 to 20 March 2015. Over 4,000 women from Government and Civil Society and academia converged on the United Nations Headquarters for the two-week meeting.

The Honourable Minister of Women, Community and Social Development, Tolofuaivalelei Falemoe Leiataua, headed the Samoan delegation consisting of Ms. Louisa Apelu, Assistant Chief Executive Officer for MWCSD, Ms. Rosalina Ah Sue, Senior Sergeant of the Ministry of Police, Ms. Faatino Utumapu of Nuanua O Le Alofa and Ms. Cherelle Fruean from the YWCA.

# Samoa Embassy in Tokyo

#### PALM 7 Senior Officials' Meeting, 4 March 2015, Tokyo, Japan.

Senior officials from all Member countries of the Pacific Islands Forum and the Forum Secretariat met with their counterparts from the Government of Japan to prepare for the 7<sup>th</sup> Pacific Leaders' Meeting with the Prime Minister of Japan, known as PALM 7. The PALM 7 Summit will be held in Iwaki-city, Fukushima, Japan on 22 and 23 May 2015.

At the pre-PALM Senior Officials' Meeting, held on 4 March in Tokyo, Forum Member officials took the opportunity to emphasize key concerns for the Pacific region, including the environment, climate change and disaster risk reduction, as well as the important reforms to regional decision-making introduced by the Framework for Pacific Regionalism. Endorsed by Forum Leaders in 2014, the Framework establishes a new political process to drive regional cooperation and integration and will be an important reference point for the Pacific's engagement with development partners, such as Japan.

The Senior Officials' Meeting also provided a valuable opportunity for Forum Members and the Government of Japan to reflect on the progress and successes of the Pacific Environ-(PEC) ment Community Fund а US\$66million initiative of PALM 5 in 2009. Under the PEC Fund, which is coordinated and managed by the Forum Secretariat, the 14 Forum Island Countries have been allocated US\$4 million each to support projects in either solar power generation or sea water desalination. Eight countries have completed their projects, while the remaining six Forum Island countries are making rapid progress in implementing their projects.

The Pacific Leaders' Meeting was initiated by Japan in 1997 to strengthen relations with Pacific Island Forum countries and work jointly towards the development of the Pacific region. Through the PALM process, Japan and Pacific Island Forum countries have an opportunity to enhance cooperation and strengthen relations. PALM meetings are held every 3 years, with the last meeting, PALM 6, held in May 2012 in Okinawa.

Samoa was represented at the PALM 7 Senior Officials' Meeting by H.E. Leiataua Dr. Kilifoti Eteuati (Ambassador of Samoa to Japan), Mrs. Tasha Siaosi (ACEO, Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade) and Mr. Rapture Pagaialii (Counsellor, Embassy of Samoa in Japan).

#### Third UN World Conference on Disaster **Risk Reduction**

14-18 March 2015, Sendai, Japan.

The UN World Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction (WCDRR) is a UN-hosted conference to discuss international strategy on disaster risk reduction. Japan hosted the third conference from 14 to 18 March 2015 in Sendai, following the first conference in Yokohama in 1994 and second conference in Kobe in 2005.

Japan, as the host country of the conference as well as an advanced country in disaster risk reduction, has been actively leading discussions toward the formulation of the new international framework for disaster risk reduction (post-2015 framework for disaster risk reduc-

as preparations for the convening of the conference in cooperation with the UN and the host city (Sendai City), among others.

Through the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction 2015-2030, the Conference outcome, participants requested the United Nations General Assembly to integrate into its post-2015 strategy for sustainable development seven goals to reduce risk for loss of life, livelihood and critical infrastructure from Ambassador Leiataua also paid farewell courdisasters, through enhanced national planning and international cooperation. destruction from earthquakes, extreme weather and other hazards around the world would be decreased significantly by 2030 according to goals set by countries at the meeting.

The new Framework calls for concrete indicators of progress towards those goals to be measured against the disaster losses in the decade after the adoption of the 2005 Hyogo Framework for Action, its predecessor. Noting the rapid growth of population in urban areas, it also calls for such progress to be measured per 100,000 people globally.

Samoa's delegation to the UN World Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction in Sendai was led by the Hon. Faamoetauloa Taito Faale Tumaalii, Minister of Natural Resources and Environment of Samoa. Mrs. Filomena Nelson, ACEO of MNRE also attended the conference as Samoa's delegate.

## Samoa Introduces Geneva Convention Bill 2015

#### Geneva Convention Bill 2015

Mr. Aiono Mose Sua, Chief Executive Officer for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade introduced and explained the proposed bill known as the 'Geneva Convention Bill 2015' to the Legislative Assembly Meeting in March. The bill hasn't been passed yet, therefore an overview of the Bill is as follows:

#### Explanatory of the Bill:

The Geneva Conventions Bill 2015 (Bill) seeks to domesticate and give effect to certain Conventions made in Geneva on 12 of August 1949 and its 2 Additional Protocols of 1977. Samoa acceded and became a party to the 4 Geneva Conventions and its Protocols on the 23 August 1984. The Conventions have a retrospective effect whereby it takes effect from 1 January 1962, whereas the Protocols took effect on 23 August 1984. The aim of the Conventions and its Protocols is to protect those who are not involved in the hostility of wars (civilians, health workers and aid workers) and those who are no longer participating in the hostilities, such as the wounded, sick and shipwrecked soldiers and prisoners of war. The Bill also provides for the protection of certain protected emblems and items such as the "Red Cross" designation and emblem. Finally, the Bill makes consequential amendments to the Samoa Red Cross Act 1993.

#### Clauses:

#### PART 1 PRELIMINARY

Clause 1: - provides for the short title of the Bill which will be called the "Geneva Conventions Act 2015" once it is passed. The Act is to commence on the date it is assented to by the Head of State.

Clause 2: - provides for the definitions of certain terms and phrases used in the Bill.

Clause 3: - provides for the meaning and description of certain protected emblems and items that are protected under the Bill.

Clause 4: - provides that any reservation or declaration made by Samoa during its ratification of a Convention or Protocol, such Convention or Protocol is subject to that reservation r declaration.

#### PART 2 BREACH OF THE CONVEN-TIONS OR PROTOCOLS

Clause 5: - provides for the offence and penalty for the breach of the Conventions or Protocols. Any grave breach that occurs outside Samoa may be prosecuted as if the offence was committed in Samoa.

Clause 6: - provides the meaning of a grave breach.

Clause 7: - provides that the Court cannot proceed with a trial of a person charged under section 5 unless the person is represented by a lawyer.

Clause 8: - provides that for a proceeding for an offence under section 5, there should be a certificate of the Minister specifying that the Conventions or Protocols apply.

#### PART 3 LEGAL PROCEEDINGS FOR PROTECTED PERSONS

Clause 9: - provides that Part 3 applies to a protected prisoner of war and protected internee that is brought up for trial for an offence.

Clause 10: - provides that the Court cannot proceed with a trial of a protected prisoner of war unless he/she is represented by a lawyer.

Clause 11: - provides that a notice of trial must be served by the prosecution on the defendant at least three (3) weeks before the trial.

Clause 12: - explains that this section only applies if at the time of conviction or sentence of the protected person, there is a protecting power for him/her and that the protecting power must be notified if the sentence is more than two (2) years imprisonment.

Clause 13: - provides that the Court may give direction to deduct the time a protected person was remanded in custody from his/her sentence upon their conviction.

#### PART 4 PROTECTED EMBLEMS

Clause 14: - provides that consent from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade is required for the use of any of the protected emblems and items. The only exception is the Samoa Red Cross in relation to the use or display of the red cross emblem and the designation "Red Cross".

Clause 15: - creates an offence for the use or display of a protected emblem or item without the consent of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

Clause 16: - provides that the court may make a forfeiture order in relation to an offence committed under section 15(1). PART 5 MIS-CELLANEOUS

Clause 17: - provides for the Head of State's power to make regulations on the advice of Cabinet.

Clause 18: - provides for consequential amendments made to the Samoa Red Cross Act 1993.

Schedule: - provides the list of the Geneva Conventions and its Protocols which apply to this  $\operatorname{Act.}$
