



The flag of Samoa (Samoan: fu'a o Sāmoa) was first adopted from February 24, 1949 for UN Trusteeships, and continuously applied for the state's independence on January 1, 1962.

The flag of Samoa is rectangular in shape and red in color. The upper quadrant of the flag towards the hoist-side features a blue rectangle or canton. This canton bears the Southern Cross which consists of four five-pointed stars and a smaller one. The stars are all white in color.

The colors used in Samoa's flag have their own symbolic meanings. The white color of the stars represents purity. The red color represents courage and the blue color represent freedom, these colors of the flag denote loyalty and patriotism, respectively. The pattern of the stars on the blue canton represents the Southern Cross constellation.
